His father ended up recovering and then they came to the U.S. to better their lives after the trauma they went through.

School is held to a very serious standard in the DRC so when I started to see kids act out and lose focus in class I was baffled. Since I could remember, school was not something that should be joked around with and that was the opposite here in the States," he says.

His work ethic is on another level. Ever since I've known Marve, he's always had the reputation for being an incredibly smart kid. When it comes to school and sports, he's been excelling ever since he started. He had never even touched an American football in the Congo, but after he started playing, his love for the game expanded and he quickly became one of the best in our school. When it comes to school, he's always tried his hardest, never taking it for granted.

In the future, Marve plans on attending Oregon State University next year and eventually ending up in the sports marketing field. He hopes to achieve these goals of his in the most honorable fashion, and always put that incredible work ethic to good use.
